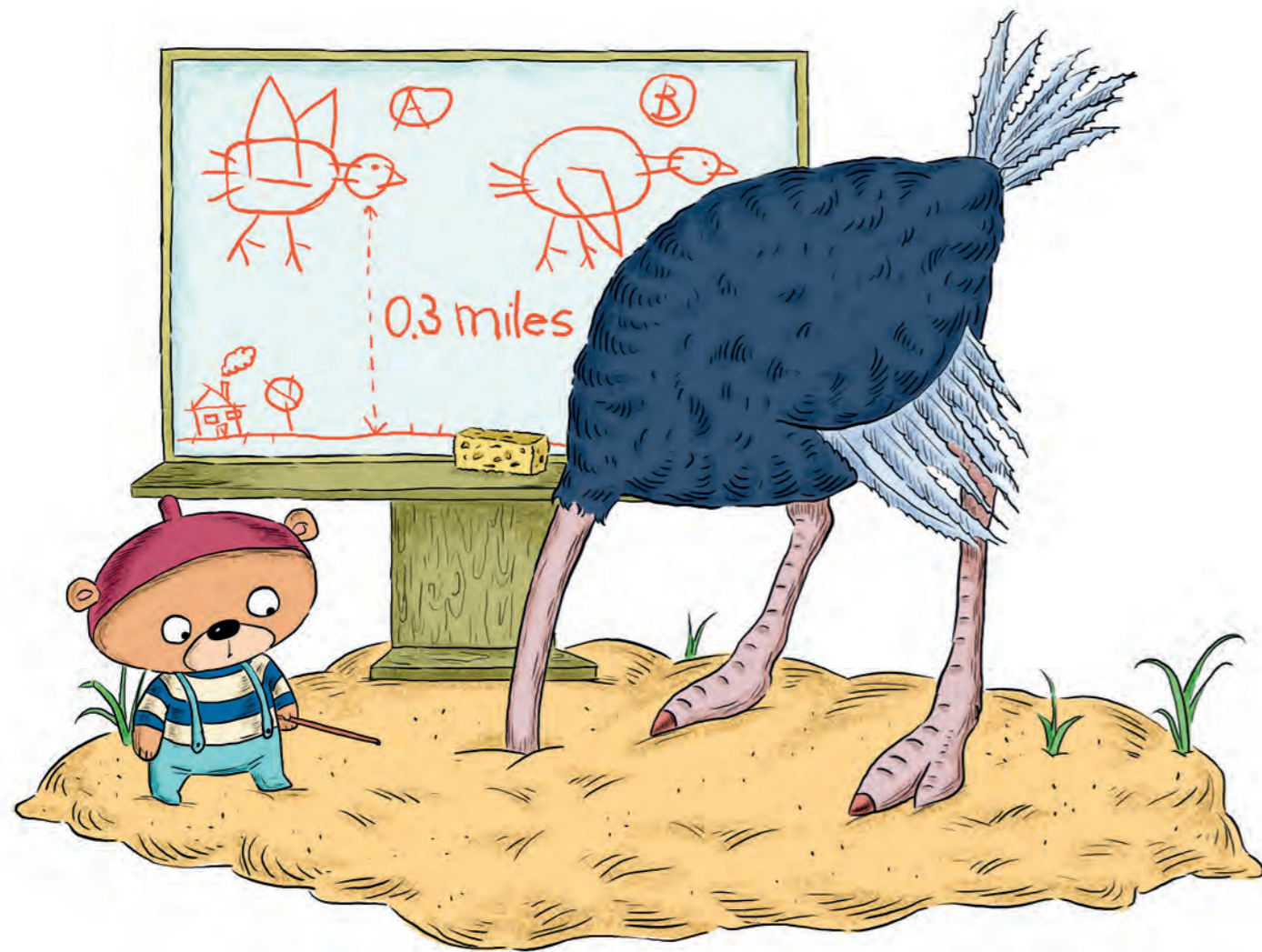
TEACHING EDDIE TO FLY

Eddie starts walking, slowly . . .



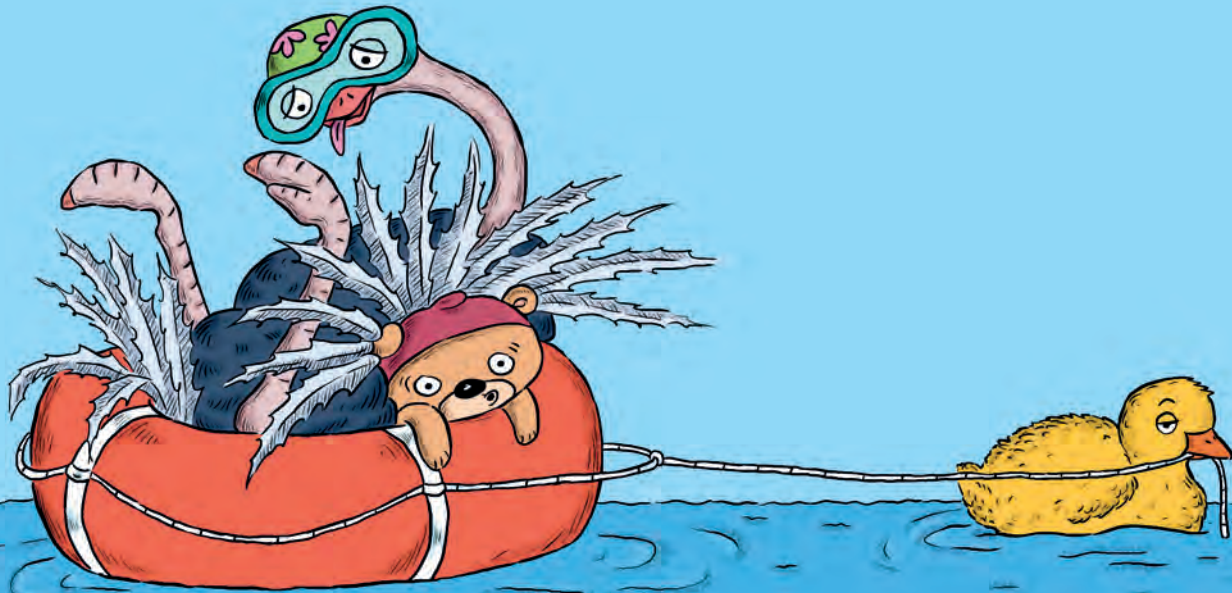

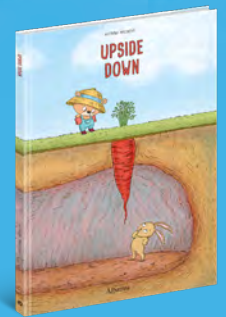
